News from ESCAIDE 2015, Stockholm, Sweden

EAN Travel Grants

EAN travel grant recipient - Dr Lala Harisoa Rabetaliana

- From: Indian Ocean Field Epidemiology Training Programme, Madagascar
- Presented: Oral presentation 'Pneumonic plague outbreak following case migration from the endemic highlands – municipality of Ambaohoabe, Madagascar, December 2013'

This conference took place in Stockholm over 3 days with 450 epidemiologists from across the world participating. The persons in charge of the ESCAIDE showed a great professionalism, effectiveness and human qualities in the organization. It was my first experience in an International Conference, but I testify that the organization had been remarkable. Thank you for the quality of the reception and organization.

It was an immense pleasure for me to participate in this conference because that allowed me:

- to reinforce my experiences, my competences and my knowledge in epidemiology field and medical sciences. The presentations of the participants allowed me to have ideas on the improvement of investigations in epidemic events in Madagascar
- to have new relations with other scientific participants. I am very proud and satisfied to have these relations. Many scientific exchanges and cultural were already done between my new relations and me
- to discover Stockholm which is a peaceful city, not polluted and clean.

I particularly appreciated the cordial environment that the ESCAIDE offered to me. I have excellent memories of this conference which I will be ready to take part in again for the next ESCAIDE conference in November 2016.

- Presented: Oral presentation 'Outbreak Investigation of Anthrax, Kuruchdega Village in Simdega District of Jharkhand, India 2014'

The European Scientific Conference on Applied Infectious Disease Epidemiology conference at Stockholm, Sweden was an exciting experience predominantly focused on research into new tools which are sensational developments. The inauguration of the conference by Dr Andrea Ammon enlightening the comprehensive focus in outbreak and microbial resistance was a learning experience. The conference bar camp was an innovation on bringing experts across the world to a common table for discussion.

The most learning experience for me was attending the sessions on outbreaks which actually reflected a wide range of infectious disease from Salmonella to Plague including Anthrax in my presentation. I am glad that my oral presentation on anthrax was well appreciated. I was one among the many who got woken from a complacent listening state with the presentation of antimicrobial resistance being a growing problem worldwide and more from India. The presentation on Ebola by Dr Pierre Formenty (WHO) was an eye opener on how to strategize the Ebola epidemic response plan.

The e-poster session was thrilling with good discussion with the presenters on various country-specific and disease-specific contexts. The day continued with moderated poster sessions and several parallel sessions on topics ranging from successful vaccination coverage to estimating the burden of communicable diseases. Introduction and enhancement of social media in disease control and prevention is an approach which has a long way to go.

At the end, I would like to express my sincere gratitude to EAN for awarding me the travel grant to make it to the ESCAIDE 2015 and present my paper.

Well my experience in ESCAIDE 2015 began with the trip to Stockholm all the way up from my country, Portugal. I have to say that although the difference between temperatures is quite high, Stockholm is very warm in the way it receives its visitors and I personally think it is one of the best cities to host such an event as ESCAIDE is.

It's a beautiful city and has some places and venues that will make anyone became amazed, besides being one of the reference cities for knowledge and culture as the very well-known Nobel prizes are decided and delivered in Stockholm in a building that all ESCAIDE participants could get to know and get inspired by.

Most important even than that was the event itself were I really learned about many epidemiological problems not only in Europe but from around the world and could get a fine grasp and reality check about what is going on and what scientists are trying to show and prove, in order to help the general public health.

It is a wonderful experience for young scientists like myself because we can learn with the more experienced ones and get in contact with them face to face, as all of the event relies heavily on discussions about the themes presented which is one of the best ways to learn something and for each one to get better at what they are doing.

You can also put some of your doubts to scientists that are working with something similar to your work and in that way get to clarify questions that you couldn't resolve by yourself or just would take much more time to figure it out alone.

I presented two posters at this event and I enjoyed the experience a lot, because while I was afraid before that I couldn't make myself understand, soon that feeling disappear in the presentation and with the questions put on by the public or the moderator. It's like if you are transmitting your work with people from all backgrounds but in a more familiar way just like in your office or laboratory.

I was put in contact with some experts in the area that I want to work and got encouraged by them as they shared their experience and way of working and saw the problems I have, helping me, so that I don't have to pass for the same as they did.

Resuming, all the experience was very enriching to me and I hope that in future events I can be attending at ESCAIDE either presenting my scientific works or just as a participant learning from the best.

New President: Aileen Kitching

I am a medical doctor from Ireland. After some years in clinical medicine (hospital medicine & general practice in Ireland, Scotland & Australia) and almost a year working with Médecins sans Frontières in post-war Liberia, I moved to London in 2007 to become part of Cohort 13 of EPIET, a decision I have never regretted. After 2 great years as a Fellow at the Health Protection Agency, I completed my specialisation in Public Health Medicine in London, working mainly at the former HPA / now Public Health England during that time. In Sept 2015 I moved back to Ireland to take up a Consultant/ Specialist post in the Department of Public Health in Cork, where I work in health protection/communicable disease control (HIV, STIs, hepatitis) and in health inequalities.

I have gained a lot both from EPIET, and also from the Alumni Network - personally as well as professionally. This was brought home to me more recently when I had the opportunity to work with other Alumni & current Fellows in the field, in the response to Typhoon Haiyan in the Philippines in 2014 and in the Ebola response in Sierra Leone in 2015. New Secretary: Lisi Aichinger

My name is Elisabeth ("Lisi") Aichinger and I will be one of the two EAN secretaries for the next two years. I grew up in a small village in Austria. My dad was working as a pathologist and microbiologist, so I soon became interested in bacteria and viruses. During high school, I spent one year in Edmonton, Alberta, where my enthusiasm for travelling started. After finishing my medical studies in Salzburg, Austria, I continued my education with a MSc in Control of Infectious Diseases at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. As part of my master thesis I was working in India for several months, researching on latrine use and faecal contamination in the environment.

Fortunately, in 2010 I got the chance to become a part of the fabulous cohort 16 as a German FETP based in the Baden-Wuerttemberg State Health Office in Stuttgart. After finishing the programme, I stayed in the State Health Office, now working in health protection and infectious disease surveillance. As a secretary for EAN, I am looking forward to contribute to the community within the next two years. I believe that being part of the EPIET/FETP "family" is a great asset, personally and occupationally. So I am really looking forward to working with you all.



Where is he now? - a story from the field....

Title: Where do the quitting EPIET coordinators go?

Introduction: EPIET coordinators are supposed to do something with their lives after quitting the programme. This is especially important as the process of quitting leave in their minds a feeling of emptiness and despair. We aimed to describe the fate of one representative excoordinator.

Methods: We obtained a list of terminated coordinators from Arnold Bosman's iBrain Air Pro ver.4.1. We have drawn one item from this list using an algorithm such complicated that even Kostas Danis could not understand it! We interviewed the ex-coordinator and performed a description of his activities in terms of time, person and place.

Results: PS, male, 43 years old, did not know what to do after quitting EPIET in November 2015, and decided to go for a bicycle tour in Latin America. He wanted to be on the road, meet people, learn about the different societies living around there. He wanted to challenge his body and learn patience while moving slowly long distances. He wanted to reflect on his life and detach as much as possible from the competitive consumptiondriven style of life. After three months of travel he doesn't know if any of his goals has been achieved. His daily activities are reduced to pedaling, searching for food and shelter. He is often tired, meets only employees of shops and gas stations and he can never really know anybody as he is constantly on the move. The physiognomic analysis of his photos show worrying signs of deterioration.

Conclusions: The shock related to quitting EPIET probably left a permanent trace in the brain of PS. The only thing left for him is pedaling. To avoid such adverse outcomes, we therefore recommend that EPIET coordinators continue their work until safe retirement (or early death).
