Word from the president: another COVID-19 new year

Dear EAN friends and colleagues,

It is a pleasure to introduce myself as the new President of the EAN Advisory Board and to take over from Amrish (Baidjoe), after he has completed four years of term. I feel humbled to represent the EAN and I hope to contribute to the network's objectives through my enthusiasm, previous experience in the Board as secretary, background and personal touch.

I was hoping that this piece would have addressed something different than the ongoing pandemic, but unfortunately, 2 years plus after its beginning, we are still largely dealing with COVID-19, the Omicron variant and the booster vaccinations, at least in the West while the rest of the world is still struggling to get at least one dose. Since the previous newsletter, we saw the surge of the Delta variant worldwide that - we thought - it was too quick to replace the previous and was causing a lot of serious disease but hopefully was being covered by the increasing, albeit still slow, availability of vaccines. And just before the year ended, despite the hopes of a more relaxing festive season, Omicron, an even more transmissible variant, appeared and disturbed our plans putting us in a new frenzy route... But hopefully it seems less virulent, as new research suggests since it appears to bind less to the lower respiratory tract cells. The new situation and consequent public health measures are causing a further political, scientific and public divide, strong polarisation resulting in protests and further burn out of already exhausted epidemiologists and public health microbiologists. And contact tracing programmes are largely dropped in view of thousands of daily new cases in many countries, while now the discussion is turning into endemicity and setting acceptable thresholds.

FETP fellows and alumni worldwide are working around the clock to control the pandemic and are gaining valuable experience in field epidemiology, outbreak and cluster investigation, surveillance and COVID-19-related research. However, the quality of the training programmes and especially the networking component is heavily affected due to courses transitioning to online format, under-reporting of other types of outbreaks, less diversity of projects, very busy supervisors and lack of or high turn-over of scientific coordinators. In the EAN we've been closely following this situation and are engaging in discussions with the Fellowship

on how

to best tackle these challenges and how to better support the fellows. In the upcoming strategic Board meeting in February, we will further elaborate on that matter as well as plan more EAN activities for members and fellows, discuss the results of the membership survey that closed at the end of November and create a calendar of training courses and social events. Stay tuned!

Finally, I would like to wish everyone a healthy, happy and colourful 2022, where we'll be able to see, touch and kiss our friends and family again and find some time to truly rest and relax!

Interview with EUPHEM Alumna: Heli Harvala

Heli Harvala was one of Cohort 2014 EUPHEM fellows and she is sharing her experience of the EUPHEM path and how it changed her daily work at a public health organization.

EAN: Hello Heli, would you please introduce yourself and tell us where you are working currently?

Heli: Many thanks Laura. I am Heli, a Finnish Medical Virologist with interest in Public Health. I come from Northern Finland (not too far from the Arctic Circle!). After completion of my first degree in Organic Chemistry and the subsequent one in Medicine at the University of Turku Finland, I followed my heart to Scotland. There I commenced my specialist training in Medical Virology. One of the most interesting moments in my career was to step out from that training in order to undertake the EUPHEM training in Stockholm, Sweden (2014-2016). From there, I relocated to England and commenced my first Consultant Medical Virology job at the UCLH, London. However, I was truly missing the national public health aspects of work, and hence took yet another opportunity to work for NHS Blood and Transplant (Colindale, London) at the beginning of 2018. I have been working here now for four years, covering largely blood donor screening, surveillance, safety and policy aspects throughout England but linking closely with other UK nations and also internationally. While enterovirus work has remained my main hobby, I have also continued to pursue research on blood safety and genomics. I am an Honorary Clinical Associate Professor in Virology at the UCL and was nominated as a Principal Investigator for NHS Blood and Transplant last year.

EAN: What do you think is the main role of a microbiologist in a public health organisation?

Heli: I'm not sure I am the best person to cover this question as NHS Blood and Transplant is not primarily a public health organisation. However, you could say that its wider role also includes some public health aspects and that's where I certainly feel the importance of public health microbiology. In addition to the traditional aspects of microbiology including efficient and quality-controlled testing, the microbiologist plays an important role on epidemiological and genomic surveillance bringing in the clinical and microbiological knowledge into those investigations, evaluation of the effectiveness of such testing strategies, identification of need for a policy change and accumulating evidence to support that. In a more traditional public health organisation (or even hospitals), microbiologists have a pivotal role in outbreak investigations.

EAN: The EUPHEM path introduces epidemiological tools to microbiologists. How often did you use these tools in your everyday working life? Which other skills and competences did you implement in your daily duty after EUPHEM?

Heli: As I said earlier on, I am not the most typical example of how a EUPHEM might be employed. However, EUPHEM skills have been very important and useful in my current role. I analyse data trends in an almost weekly basis and feel confident doing so. EUPHEM training has also provided further tools for reporting — how to make your message clear and understandable also for a non-epidemiologist.

In our previous convalescent plasma work, I have been involved in many multivariable analyses of plasma donors, and it has really helped me to be either involved or leading such work. Communication training is also one to mention; skills to summarise and present data verbally or in writing in a concise format is a vital skill to anybody working within the public health

microbiology field. Teaching and training has also a pivotal role in my job; although evaluating and setting up learning aims and goals sometimes felt frustrating, it has really made that role easier and helped to develop teaching aspects further within my job role.

EAN: How important would you rate EUPHEM for networking? Did it change the way you interacted with European public health organizations?

Heli: Networking is a very important component of EUPHEM training and should be rated towards the top of the pyramid. Getting to know the fellow trainees across Europe has really helped with interactions and provided the framework where to start. It has also helped me to get a better understanding of the structure of public health in many countries, and how they should be approached.

EAN: You are one of the founders of the European Network for Non-Polio Enteroviruses (ENPEN) group, what is this European network and what do you think has been the role of ENPEN prior and during the COVID-19 pandemic?

Heli: We established ENPEN soon after the completion of my EUPHEM training, in 2017. Since that, ENPEN has had a leading role in collating and analysing data on significant enterovirus infections across Europe, which has already increased our understanding of these infections and how to diagnose them. We have clearly seen that more hospitals from more countries have been joining ENPEN during the pandemic, although the start of our planned hospital-based surveillance programmes had to be delayed due to the ongoing pandemic. Hospitals and laboratories are keen to work together, learn from each other and support the network in its aim towards understanding the burden of these infections, especially when the poliovirus surveillance is diminishing in many countries. We have been simply amazed and delighted to see ENPEN growing, now reaching over 50 hospitals in up to 24 European countries!

EAN: Before closing our chat, would you like to give any suggestions to the current and future EPIET/EUPHEM fellows (and maybe also to the previous ones)?

Heli: I think it is very difficult to give strong suggestions, especially at the time of COVID-19 pandemic when we all are tired, as work has stretched often too far towards late evenings and weekends! However, it is important to trust on your instincts and do what you think is best for you and for your family. You should never underestimate the importance of life outside the work, as only a balanced mind can achieve the best.



EAN General Assembly 2021

The EAN General Assembly (GA) and EAN Board elections took place virtually on 17 November 2021 during ESCAIDE 2021 and were attended by more than 90 people.

The main activities, the financial and membership status of the EAN for 2021 were presented by the Advisory Board members. Over the year, 44 weekly bulletins were sent, advertising for more than 500 job offers, 87 courses, conferences, surveys, or other events. Among others, work was done to improve the EAN website, and more advances are still planned. We also simplified membership fee payment options and implemented a credit card option (a request from several members) while discontinued the PayPal option. See details for how to pay your EAN membership at the end of the Newsletter. EAN also hosted and facilitated four webinars on various topics and participated in the creation of the Epi R Handbook. The Board members were in close contact with the EPIET/EUPHEM fellows and the Fellowship Office, organising and participating in meetings (cohort reps, TSF), the new fellows' selection process, the newly created TSF working groups and the facilitation of modules. Despite the COVID-19 pressure and burden, the activities were back on track and connections have been maintained within the network, the Whatsapp group and the newly launched Discord server playing an important role in that.

As a member of the scientific committee, EAN was involved in the preparation of ESCAIDE 2021, participating in abstract review, contributing to the organisation of a plenary session on inequality pandemic and the BarCamp event. Two side events were also organised by EAN: the career compass and ESCAIDE's photo contest.


One of the major activities of the EAN over the past year was the roll out of the 2021 Membership survey. The objective is to understand EAN members' pre- and post-fellowship situation, their

opinion on the current status of the EAN and possible evolutions. The survey included almost 100 questions on several topics: fellowship experience, career progression, core competencies past and future, EAN specific questions. The response rate was 36% (280/779). Preliminary results were presented during the EAN general assembly, and further analysis are on the board agenda for 2022 (see also below).

With over 300 active members and the EAN's finances being healthy, plans for 2022 include among others the organisation of 1-2 mini-modules, proposed topics are the use of R in statistical analysis, Whole-Genome-Sequencing method, leadership, communication. Also, an event is planned to celebrate the 26+ years of the EPIET programme. The eligibility of MediPIET alumni to join EAN will also be discussed further.

This year, there were four positions for the EAN Advisory Board to fill during the annual elections. The leaving members were Amrish Baidjoe after a 4-year term as President, Amy Mikhail as secretary, Annika Wendland as Treasurer and Zsofia Igloi as general board member after 2 years of term each. Big thanks to all leaving members for their work and dedication to the Network, especially during these challenging times. The newly elected members were Iro Evlampidou in the position of President, Laura Bubba as secretary, Charlotte Hammer as treasurer and Justine Schaeffer as general board member. Congratulations and good luck to the new EAN Advisory Board members!

We would like to say a big thank you to all our members, both alumni and fellows for attending the GA and for their constructive input and suggestions! We will share the minutes of the GA with the active EAN members very soon.

I feel honoured to be re-elected, this time in the position of the President and I hope to further the EAN's objectives and meet the expectations of our members!

I did my EPIET from 2008-2010 at the Robert Koch Institute (RKI) in

This project sparked my interest in public health and epidemiology and I started working at the regional Centre of Health in North Rhine-Westphalia back in Germany, mostly on preparedness and emergency response, as well as surveillance of tropical pathogens. I briefly went back to lab work during the Ebola outbreak in West Africa, supporting the European Mobile Lab in Guinea on Ebola diagnostics.

After completing EPIET, I went to Nigeria with MSF as a Flying Epi to work with the Nigerian Emergency Response Unit on several different projects, including

internally displaced people and childhood mortality.

Back in Germany, I have worked on hepatitis B with WHO and RKI in Berlin as a freelancer. At the moment I am living in Paris and supporting the COVID-19 team at Santé Publique France. I am happy to be able to contribute to the work of the EAN Board and reconnect with former and current fellows.

I am Italian and I started my scientific

General Board Member: Justine Schaeffer, EUPHEM cohort 2019 (2021-2023, newly elected)

I am a EUPHEM fellow from cohort 2019, and I was lucky to do my fellowship at the

Agency for Health and Food Safety (AGES), in Vienna, Austria. I started my studies in academia, with a PhD

at the

Austrian



Institut Pasteur. During my PhD, I got the chance to participate in the international efforts against the West-African Ebola outbreak (2014-2015) by working in an Ebola diagnostic lab in Guinea. It was the start of my switch, from research to public health, with first another field mission in Nigeria on Lassa fever, and then a EUPHEM application.

My EUPHEM fellowship was the opportunity to walk out of the world of viral haemorrhagic fevers, with projects on a wide range of pathogens. It included many genomic analyses, thanks to the AGES sequencing facility. Like most C2019 fellows, I had the opportunity to work on COVID-19, which led me to my current position. I am now working at Santé Publique France, in the COVID variant team, which handles the surveillance and expertise regarding SARS-CoV-2 variants in France.

As a general board member, I will support my fellow board members in all the routine tasks that are deeply undervalued but are necessary for the network to keep working. I also hope we will have a chance to start newer and more exciting projects, like some EAN modules that, if COVID allows it, will be face-to-face. They would be a great opportunity to start compensating for the missed social interactions and opportunities of the last two years.

EAN Membership survey 2021

The long awaited EAN membership survey stopped receiving responses on 30 November 2021 and collected 283, including six from the pilot study. The previous survey took place in 2013 and resulted in a publication in the journal Epidemiology & Infection.

The objectives of the current survey were to describe the EAN's member base (demographics, fellowship experience, past and current employment, skills, career paths etc.), to explore the members' vision on skills that are needed from future public health epidemiologists or microbiologists, to assess members' needs and satisfaction with the specific services provided by EAN, and to get input on the direction that EAN should or could take. The survey was quite thorough, containing 93 questions that may have affected the response rate of 36%.

The preliminary results (280 responses) were presented during the annual General Assembly. In a nutshell, the majority were females (68%) with an average age of 42 years. All past and current cohorts participated (1995-2021), apart from cohort 1999, from all programmes and tracks, although most were from the

EPIET EU-track (45%). More than half (61%) are working in National or Sub-national Public Health Institutes in the position of Epidemiologist (66%) while 11% are working as Microbiologists. The main field of day-to-day activities are surveillance (64%), research (46%), outbreak investigation (41%), teaching/capacity building (35%). Finally, two-thirds respondents agreed that their participation in the fellowship has increased their employability and/or their professional profile, while 77% stayed in Europe after finishing it suggesting the high value of the EPIET/EUPHEM training programme in the career path of the alumni and the strengthening of the European workforce.

The next steps are to fully analyse all answers, prepare relevant scientific communications that will be shared with all EAN members, the fellowship office and the scientific community and will be used to inform the future activities of the association, so stay tuned!! A big thanks to all EAN members who took the time to complete the survey!

Fellowship news

A total of five fellowships are currently running as part of the ECDC or related countries' training programmes. The European Programme for Intervention Epidemiology Training (EPIET) was established in 1995, whereas the European Public Health Microbiology Training Programme (EUPHEM) was initiated by ECDC in 2008.

Other associated programmes are the German-FETP (1996) that was renamed to Postgraduate Training for Applied Epidemiology (PAE, 2006), and the Norwegian-FETP (2001) while the UK-FETP was initiated in 2009 and became a standalone programme in 2019. Additionally, MediPIET, a European Union-DG DEVCO funded regional FETP, started in 2014 and in 2021 passed to ECDC.

Farewell/Congratulations to Cohort 2019

EPIET, EUPHEM and PAE cohort 2019, the Crude and Unadjusted cohort, was the second cohort affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. As ESCAIDE 2021 was held online, so was their graduation ceremony. It was still rhythmed by great memories, wishes for the future and, more importantly, songs! Attendants also got a visual confirmation that C2019 had many talents.

C2019 got lucky to meet in person for the Introductory Course and the outbreak investigation module. It was enough to create a strong bond between all fellows, which was carried on virtually throughout the pandemic.

Welcome to MediPIET cohort 4

In September 2021, the MediPIET Programme, an advanced regional FETP from the Mediterranean and Black Sea countries, welcomed the 4th Cohort of fellows in its family, consisting of 16 fellows from 11 partner countries (Albania, Armenia, Georgia, Kosovo¹, Lebanon, Moldova, North Macedonia, Palestine², Serbia, Tunisia, and Ukraine). MediPIET, a European Programme under the EU Initiative on Health Security is now implemented by the

European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control (ECDC) taking over from the previous implementer of MediPIET, Instituto de Salud Carlos III (ISCIII) and Fundación Estatal, Salud, Infancia y Bienestar Social (FCSAI).

We would like to welcome the 4th MediPIET cohort to the wider field epidemiology family and to wish them good luck in this wonderful endeavour.

EPIET/EUPHEM Fellowship meetings

Since the last newsletter was out in September 2021, the Training Site Forum (TSF) members with the Fellowship Office met in different occasions to discuss topics concerning the fellowships such as the wellbeing of the fellows and relevant training, the scientific coordinator situation, the survey on updating the competencies in applied infectious disease epidemiology, as well as to launch the TSF working groups.

The 2021 Q3 and Q4 TSF meetings took place on 29/9 and 14/12 respectively. Additionally, the EPIET and EUPHEM supervisors

continued to meet monthly and the working groups had their first meetings to define the groups' objectives and the working mode while they presented their progress during the Q4 TSF meeting.

Currently, the active working groups are on the "Curricular Revision Process", "Under-represented countries", "International Assignments", "Selection Process" and "Quality Improvement" and the EAN Board members are actively participating and providing their input.

Events & Activities

ESCAIDE 2021

This year, as in 2020, the ESCAIDE 2021 was virtual and took place between 16-19 November 2021 due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. More than 2500 public health professionals and epidemiologists from the European Union and around the world gathered together to discuss in more than 100 sessions with over 200 speakers the latest scientific advances on a broad range of topics.

The agenda included the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic (epidemiology, surveillance, lessons learnt, etc.), infectious diseases (food-, water-, vector- and blood-borne, respiratory, etc.), healthcare associated infections and many many others

during oral and poster presentations. There were also four plenary sessions with prominent speakers and panellists on communication (plenary A), modelling (plenary B), digital health (plenary C) and inequalities (plenary D) as well as five side sessions and seminars on MediPIET, SONAR-Global social science methods, NPIs, antimicrobial resistance and epidemiology & immunology. The EAN, one of the members of the ESCAIDE Scientific Committee, participated, as every year, with different activities and events that you can read more about below.

(Public Health Regional Director for London, UK), Ellen t'Hoen (Lawyer and public health advocate at Medicines Law & Policy, Netherlands), Rossalina Latcheva (Programme Manager at the EU Agency for Fundamental Rights).

Reflections on Career Compass at ESCAIDE 2021

What is one thing that Dr. Chikwe Ihekweazu, Professor Marion Koopmans, and Dr Mike Ryan have in common? They all had strong feelings for the EPIET/EUPHEM programmes and were happy to chat with current and former fellows about careers in public health.

The 5th edition of Career Compass took place on 16th November as a side event during ESCAIDE. Initiated by EAN, the Career Compass is an informal Q&A event that brings together fellowship alumni, current fellows and friends of the EAN network. It is usually co-organised by EAN and fellows from the senior cohort who invite a panel of five people at various stages of their careers and diverse working backgrounds to discuss everything and anything related to becoming fully-fledged public health professionals.

This year we aimed for three "big shots."

We were amazed when Dr Chikwe Ihekweazu (EPIET 2003), Professor Marion Koopmans and Dr Mike Ryan (EPIET 1996) all accepted our invitation. These widely respected and regarded public health experts reflected on how the fellowship benefitted their careers and shared their thoughts on how the fellowship

could position itself in the future. They shared their stories and experience about their careers, including frustrations and work-related setbacks they've experienced. The multidisciplinary and fellows' diverse backgrounds were highlighted as a unique feature and the key to the fellowship's success, which Mike referred to as "the great European experiment." We heard very needed strong, encouraging words about the importance of work-life balance, the importance of trusting our instincts and having the courage to achieve what we set out to do.

The discussion echoed a strong message that there is no such thing as a fixed career path. Setbacks and changes of directions happen and are necessary for growth.

Barcamp 2021

Summer 2014. "I need your help for a pioneering semi-anarchic event at this year's ESCAIDE. Unbelievably, ECDC is involved as well (voluntarily): for the first time, they plan to host a BarCamp."

This was the first shout-out to my friends from cohort 2006 (cohort12) in 2014. BarCamp started out as an idea to hack ESCAIDE from the inside without ECDC realising it. A bunch of new and old experts in their field, ad-hoc self-proposed topics, voting and discussing these topics by participants, while drinking ECDC sponsored booze. ECDC supplying the infrastructure and EAN (subsequently) stepping in to provide moderators and kickstart topics.

ECDC as an EU organisation is sometimes overly bureaucratic, however, the ESCAIDE orga-team is far from that. Howard, Luciana, Cristina, Polya, Tarik, and many others were pure joy and professional to work with. The first topic ever, "discrimination felt after returning home from an Ebola mission", set the scene for everything to come. The speakers were in a friendly and understanding environment and could feel safe to discuss very personal experiences or opinions. There was lots of audience feedback and those who were not on an Ebola mission in 2014 could much better relate to the emotional costs of "being in an epidemic". Karma called back for the rest of us with COVID...

Fast forward to summer 2021. One of the design goals of BarCamp@ESCAIDE has been to be digital-free. No PowerPoint, no restrictions on how many bullet points in what font size the human brain can process. That does not work with teleconferencing, at least not with our skills and tech. Fortunately, ESCAIDE had been digital the year before and Cristina from ECDC had good ideas on how to digitise analog BarCamp. EAN had already been in discussion with the ESCAIDE committee about BarCamp and after shaking off the COVID torpor a small ECDC-EAN team could work on the how-when-what of BarCamp 2021. Our email thread was called "virtual peacock feathers", just to give an idea about our state of mind.

The topics in 2021 were:

- (1) "I feel extremely exhausted after nearly 2 years of pandemic (like the movie groundhog day). What is your secret recipe to boost your morale?" Suggestions ranged from Sauna to pretending to live in a cyberpunk dystopia. Links on the topic were shared in the chat, e.g. on burnout: Forbes or workforce exodus:
- (2) "Should public health scientists be public health advocates? What is our role in speaking 'truth to power'?". This resonated with chat comments like "... were you in a situation that you could have answered but were afraid of the consequences in case your words are twisted? Especially COVID related topics are often like wildfire" or "we used to be somehow 'independent' from the government, but that is gone now!!!". A counter opinion was "Even if we are working for the government, we are still citizens and entitled to our own opinion. Therefore, we should be able to voice our opinion, provided we make clear that it is not our employer's opinion...But there is active discouragement of social media use."

The discussion was refreshingly taboo-free with opinions like "For the things happening within the European borders (and there is a lot of extremely bad stuff happening) [ECDC] should [speak up about humanitarian health]" seconded with "I understand what you mean, feel we need to speak to the moral and ethical values of public health, we will see more and more of this. Silence has consequences as well, which is more an individual choice in the end".

At this point, it was a very open and healthy debate but limited through the digital format. Whereas a live discussion is real-time, posting comments often cannot keep up with the "flow" and cannot gauge the audience support, especially for difficult subjects outside corporate opinion.

(3) "With limited COVID vaccine production, is it justified to give booster shots in 'rich' countries when at the same time few people in 'poorer' countries had any vaccine at all?"

Here, I played devil's advocate and put forward that rich countries' governments have to protect their own citizens and we do not know about the equitable distribution of shots once the

vaccines arrive in poorer countries. Fortunately, Amrish vouched for me and the discussion began with an account from an EAN member currently working in sub-Saharan Africa who raised issues of unequitable distribution in the beginning but also said that it works in the end. Freeing up patents and involving researchers from low/middle income countries in the development of vaccines to give agency were suggestions. It was puzzling that the implicit option of opening patents is allowed under current trade agreements, but not used during a pandemic. Suggested links can be found here.

After the official end of BarCamp, some stayed online for a few drinks (and Lego models).

As I go through the chat protocols shared by the ESCAIDE orga team, 60% of comments were greetings, welcomes and offers of support to old and new BarCamp/EPIET participants. We all could reconnect to a larger body of friends, small and big heroes and share our experiences. It was one of the few moments where time stood still and I could really relax and feel "same" with a lot of people.

Looking forward to seeing you in the next BarCamp and huge thanks to Cristina, Stine, Amrish and Lisa!

Other events

EAN webinar on "Vaccine equity", 5 October 2021

On 5 October 2021, EAN organised an online discussion meeting on "Vaccine inequity" that was initiated by C2020 fellow Emily Meyer. In that brainstorming session current fellows and EPIET alumni discussed vaccine equity.

In a vivid discussion we shared our concerns regarding access to vaccines, including patents, COVAX and private donations but also information equity, ranging from infodemic management to

vaccine confidence and hesitant. While we have not found the solution (yet!), it was great to exchange thoughts on what our role as field epidemiologist in all of this is and could become.

The session at ESCAIDE2021 on the "Inequity pandemic" was the continuity of the matter and they were both generated by the big general interest in our alumni network for issues related to health inequity issues.

Webinar: Using social media as a global health researcher

On Thursday 18 November 2021, the EAN members Sonia Boender (C2018) and current EPIET Fellow Ida Sperle (C2020) hosted a 3-hour session on social media as part of the Global Health PhD and Postdoc Writing Retreat organised and hosted by Uniting Streams. The workshop provided insights to what social media are, how researchers can use them to follow a topic of interest, promote their own research, and engage and network online.


The workshop also included practical tips and tricks, and key information on the different available platforms and how to make the best use of them. Interactive parts of the workshop allowed the participants to explore developing messages based on their own research and think through potential benefits and challenges with using social media as part of their professional communication.

Moreover, personal experiences of the use of social media to spread public health messages were presented via main lectures. Sonia presented the story of the development of a 'vaccinated

that includes blood and a needle. Ida shared her experience with the European Testing Week initiative, which has used social media to grow momentum and awareness for HIV, hepatitis and STI testing.



International meetings and news

GOARN Global Meeting of Partners 2021 virtual meeting, 14-16 December 2021

The EAN, represented by Iro Evlampidou (President), participated in The Global Outbreak Alert and Response Network (GOARN) Global Meeting of Partners 2021, which was held from 14 to 16 December 2021 virtually. This 4-yearly meeting aimed to provide the space for all GOARN Partners to discuss GOARN's strategic direction, operations and activities as well as the global priorities and challenges in epidemic alert and response. Partners that attended the meeting were decision makers and operation leads of partner agencies, and key stakeholders on behalf of their institution.

Some of the take home messages included that GOARN's work is relevant and that it needs to use its experience to shape the

future of global pandemic preparedness and response, to scale up its capacities, work more efficiently, with higher standards and closer to national authorities and partners. Other discussions were around the need to rethink the governance model, the professionalization and expansion of the network and the need to speak out but also the improvement of the quality of services and the safety during deployments. The next steps are to finalise the strategic plan for 2022-2026 and the History project and to create a clear advocacy and communications engagement. The EAN has been an active GOARN partner since 2004 with over 35 deployments in various parts of the world, such as in DRC, Yemen, Comoros, West Africa, and Greece.

Global Technical Meeting of the Epidemic Intelligence from Open Sources initiative (EIOS) meeting, WHO & EAN session on social media

The use of social media is moving from the fringes of public health practice, to being used more frequently by institutes and public health specialists alike. At the same time, an increasing body of research and evidence shows how social media can be used for public health surveillance.

On Tuesday 7 December 2021, the EAN members Raquel Medialdea, Giri Shankar, Sonia Boender and Leah Morantz hosted the session "Social Media & Public Health Intelligence: the Good, the Bad, the Ugly" as part of the 2021 Global Technical Meeting of the Epidemic Intelligence from Open Sources initiative, hosted by WHO. During this two-hour webinar, participants explored a range

of uses of social media tools to gather public health intelligence to supplement existing routine data sources for informed decision making. Using a combination of case studies and real-life examples, the session highlighted the potential benefits and pitfalls of social media tools for Public Health Institutes and to provide a perspective on how professionals and institutes can use social media for the benefit of public health. This interactive session gathered participants' best practises, potential pitfalls and challenges with these tools and their implementation in practice. A recording of the session will be made available via the EAN website in the future.

Obituaries

In memoriam Peter Kreidl

For most people in the EPIET network, Peter Kreidl was a familiar name that meant either an inspiring teacher, an enthusiastic colleague, a passionate advocate for measles vaccination, or simply a good friend. And most often, all of

those things at once. On October 8, 2021, Peter Kreidl passed away suddenly unexpected his hometown of Innsbruck, Austria, The news of his death shocked the network, resulting in a wave of heartfelt messages of sympathy and consolation.



Peter was selected as an EPIET fellow in Cohort 3, 1997. During the next two years, he worked and trained at the Istituto Superiore di Sanita (ISS) in Rome, Italy, under the supervision of Stefania Salmaso. His affinity for vaccine-preventable diseases showed soon when he studied the coverage of the Italian childhood immunization programme. In addition, he investigated several vaccine-preventable disease outbreaks and joined a mission to Sudan in response to a meningitis epidemic.

And Peter was the kind of guy that would forge friendships that lasted a lifetime.

After EPIET the ISS hosted Peter for several months, followed by several consultant missions for WHO, before he started work in the regional epidemiologic observatory in Bolzano, Italy, in 2001. In line with his EPIET training, Peter's main activities were surveillance, training, and occasionally outbreak investigations. In 2007 he joined the European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control, where he worked on epidemic intelligence and pandemic preparedness, among other things. All of us, colleagues at ECDC, felt the intense pain as Peter received the horrible news of the death of his son Felix. Working in Stockholm, with the family in Austria became very hard, and in 2013, Peter moved back to Austria to become an epidemiologist at the Ministry of Health. In 2015, he switched to full time teaching at the University and spreading his contagious enthusiasm for epidemiology among new generations.

Peter's death has triggered many friends and colleagues to share their memories. They recall his kindness, friendship and inspiring passion, his sense of adventure. They mention him as a driving force in the area of vaccine-preventable diseases, even literally, when he took his vintage VW bus on the road in Austria during the EU Immunization Week.

There is so much to tell still, about our friend Peter Kreidl. We will keep those stories and memories to be shared among reunions of friends, as he would have loved.

In memoriam Mia Brytting

With great sadness we heard that Mia Brytting passed away on the 15th January 2022. The sad news shocked the family, friends and colleagues and it will be only in the days to come that we discover how much we miss her. We who worked with Mia for a long time appreciated her deep knowledge, her power of action and sense of duty. Mia was always in a good mood and met colleagues with warmth and care.

Mia began her career at the Swedish Bacteriological Laboratory (SBL) as early as 1989 and has since worked at SBL, the Swedish Institute for Infectious Disease Control (SMI) and the Public Health Agency of Sweden.

She has long been one of the country's leading experts on respiratory viruses and had a special interest and knowledge of influenza. Mia has been section and unit manager since the early 2000s and has been responsible for activities related to respiratory viruses and immunological follow-ups of the national vaccination program.

She was the EUPHEM front woman in Sweden and implemented EUPHEM at the Public Health Agency of Sweden.

She was a much appreciated mentor to several EUPHEM fellows in Sweden and we believe she will be missed by many in the program. Mia had a large network of contacts and this temporary webpage was set up by Mia's colleagues together with the EPIET Alumni Network (EAN) to give everyone outside the Public Health Agency of Sweden the opportunity to leave their condolences and a message of consolation to Mia's family. All comments will be compiled and shared with the family by the end of February.
